2017 Programs Summary

Summer Camp:

24 disadvantaged children and 7 volunteers from Belarus, Syria, Iraq, Italy and India learning about peace and friendship by the Cretan Sea

Dear Friend of Crete For Life,

This year we were truly thrilled to have welcomed children and young adults from further afield, by the Cretan Sea. These last few years we have all seen hundreds of thousands of people fleeing war and persecution from countries such as Syria and Iraq, arriving in Greece to look for peace and a future. Many of them are children and young adults.

From living normal lives surrounded by family and friends, too many find themselves without any control of their present and their future existence. We are often told that charity volunteers are the only link they have to some sort of normal community and to human acknowledgement.

While working at Skaramangas Hot Spot we met smart, polite, lively teenagers and we decided to invite them to be volunteers to the younger campers who are children living with chronic illness from Belarus areas affected by the Chernobyl Catastrophe. Our strong hunch was that by making the refugees into volunteers, everyone won. The results showed that this could not have been more true.

Having experienced war, man-made catastrophe or chronic illness, Crete For Life young campers compared notes on what happened to them and their families and how they are coping with their lives. Then they moved on together to have very happy times and build strong friendships by the Cretan Sea. Cultural, religious, ethnical differences were used as building blocks. The lesson we learned from them is that life, fun, laughter and friendship always, always wins. Omnia vincit amor.

In this report you can read about this and the other exciting projects we have been involved in and that we very much hope to be able to continue to do in the future.

It is with deep gratitude that we thank you all, foundations, donors, sponsors, supporters, partners and friends, for making this journey together with us, enabling Crete For Life to be active in giving children and young adults the support and help they deserve.

OUR MISSION

Committed to children in need, working from Crete.

Crete For Life is a child focused charity that works on practical projects to make an immediate – but hopefully lasting - impact on children's lives.

What we do

Since 2005, our main project is an annual restorative, fun filled holiday on Crete for sick children, who might otherwise never have a holiday. We have welcomed children coping with life threatening diseases from Greece, Belarus (those affected by the consequences of the Chernobyl's catastrophe) Syria, Iraq and from other parts of the world.

Over recent years, in response to the Greek economical crisis and the unprecedented mass migration and refugee crisis, we have moved into other areas of support:

- Helping refugees and migrants on the island of Crete and elsewhere in Greece, giving priority to unaccompanied minors and those most at risk.
- Supporting Crete's university hospital who serves thousands of children every year.
- Providing local children whose families & communities have suffered greatly from the economic downturn with practical help, medical assistance and emotional support .

Why

Because we believe everyone, regardless of nationality, race or faith, has unique gifts, talents and contributions to make. Whether born in a socially unsuitable environment or a victim of war, natural or man made disaster, children and young adults are the most vulnerable part of our community, but they are also our major investment and hope for the future.

Our vision

Our vision is a world where every child has opportunities.

Our values

We strive to be **accountable**: as an organisation, we are accountable for everything we do, to our members, founders, donors and to the children and young people we support.

We try to be **inclusive**: We aim to support all children and young people, putting particular focus on those who most need our support. This includes children from families in poverty, with chronic illness and disabilities and those from minority ethnic background.

We want to **empower and encourage independence**: We believe in supporting disadvantaged children to go on to have better lives and reach their potential.

We are a small charity who wants to support disadvantaged children with practical help but also by building personal, positive, warm relationships in the tradition of the Cretan hospitality (φιλοξενία).

SUCCESS STORIES

We played for peace!

Children from different nationalities, religions, languages and backgrounds enjoyed Crete For Life summer camp 2017 and found a way to play for peace together! Greek, Belarusian, Syrian, Iraqi and Yazidi children and young adults shared their experiences of living with the consequences of the Chernobyl catastrophe and the war and persecution in Syria and Iraq and used it as a starting point for getting to know each other and hearing about the life experiences of their contemporaries. Sharing the Cretan Sea together and



many hours of fun and friendship, the campers found a place for healing, forming many long lasting friendships. Thanks to volunteers from Play For Peace®, we all learned that a common language is possible through all inclusive, cooperative play, creating laughter, compassion and peace!



Shoes For Children on the move

Thousands of children are running away from war, violence and persecution and are on a long march towards a better future. Many of them, however, lack suitable shoes, especially during the winter months. Thanks to our crowd funding campaign and the help of many friends and supporters, we have distributed new, or as new winter shoes to many children in homes, camps and schools. Good quality winter shoes insulate the children from the cold, protecting them from accidents and illness. The children we helped were able to walk, run, jump, go to school and play with their friends, keeping warm, dry and hopefully safe.



Tomato express

Crete, and particularly the area around Ierapetra, is one of Greece's main areas for year-round cultivation of fruits and vegetables in greenhouses. Crete For Life receives or buys fresh produces of high quality which are the wrong size or shape to be sold by the great distribution. Local farmers find a way to sell, for a small profit, their imperfect vegetables, which might otherwise end up as waste; Crete For Life, together with Athens charity "Pampiraiki", distributes fresh vegetables and fruits to refugees, migrants and impoverished families in mainland Greece.

SUMMER CAMP 2017

Objective

To provide free hospitality by the Cretan Sea to children from disadvantaged situations that would benefit physically and emotionally from the experience.

What were the outputs?

We provided 4 to 2 weeks stay for 31 children, young adults and volunteers, including creative and outdoors events, Play for Peace® training in personal development and leadership skill, and we also catered for additional individual needs.

As part of our program, we had daily session by the beach practicing swimming, beach games, various sports and arts and crafts. The campers ate home cooked food from the world renowned Cretan diet, enriched by the locally grown vegetables. They also took part in local activities meeting children and adults from the local community.

We offered free of charge holidays to socially vulnerable children who would not have otherwise have such a chance. Children and teenagers from different areas of Belarus and other countries, especially, those from isolated living conditions, were able to meet other children, feel more confident and try new activities.

We worked with partner organisations Medicine and Chernobyl and Play for Peace® as well as local organization such as the Red Cross and the local authorities.



K. and R. are 16 years old and both left Syria, their school, friends and extended families 2 years ago, running away from Isis. Crete reminded them of their previous lives where they would be out with friends, eating ice cream. While in Ierapetra they also learned to swim.

For 17 years old M. from Aleppo, the Cretan Sea acted as antidote against his traumatic escape from Syria. He was the funny, cheeky, gentle of the group and while in Crete he became protective of youngest children. He made sure everyone was always included in the activities and communicated through laughter and smiles.

M. has gone through excruciatingly painful surgery with the aim of extending his height a little. At first he was very shy and kept by himself, but thanks to the inclusive, fun atmosphere he found in Crete, he started to play and swim and never missed a game..

SUMMER CAMP 2017


What were the outcomes?

At the end of their Cretan stay the participants reported:

- **Improvement in general physical health**, confirmed by doctors travelling with the children, their parents and guardians.
- Being together in a calm natural setting improved relaxation and **mental wellbeing**. Socializing with peers improved **self confidence** and social skills.
- The atmosphere in the group, especially thanks to guided non competitive games, resulted in the **total inclusion** of all children notwithstanding disability, gender, background, race or religion differences.
- **Integration into a different society/ community**. The local Cretan community was welcoming and generous to all children. Any initial concern of discrimination, especially towards refugees, was mistaken. In the small town of Ierapetra, the children and young adults felt at ease and blended in with the locals.
- Learning new skills: for example, **improved communication skills** as not having a common language, apart from a little English, seemed to pose no big problem, even when there were meetings focused on discussion and planning of activities.
- Having **a lot of fun, collecting positive memories and experiences** and above all making **new friends** from different countries with whom to stay in touch through social channels

FROM OUR PARTNERS

Play for Peace's mission is to bring together children, youth, and organizations from communities in conflict, using cooperative play to create laughter, compassion, and peace.

"We connected to Crete for Life (Olimpia) in Skaramangas camp in Athens, Greece. Olimpia saw Play for Peace® in action as we facilitated a session with youth in the camp. It was her vision that saw the refugee youth as resource persons. She invited us to become part of the summer program where young people from Belarus come for a month for healing and recuperation. The 2 weeks we spent were a live evidence of Play for Peace® being a process of 'community building'. Often people ask us what do you do when you face a challenge. Often our answer is we go back to the basic tenant 'Trust the process'.



It was this 'trust the process' that Crete for Life put in action by including Play for Peace® in a program that has been running successfully for almost a decade.

To invite youth from a refugee camp to come and work with young people from different culture & language requires trust and beyond that confidence. It also indicates a desire and drive to evolve and bring in new inputs. It was a valuable partnership for us as we saw the journey of young people from camp and from Belarus meeting first time having no common ground.



Play for Peace® sessions helped them laugh together, see each other being vulnerable. This set the tone for the connection between them. A picture from the last day would suffice to summarize what happened. It was like members of a family parting, the tears just wouldn't stop.

Play for Peace® in our experience is also a process of healing and we have experienced it having worked many times in relief camps (for people affected by man made disaster and natural calamities). The tears on the last day were also tears of healing that were grounded in the reality that they belong, that they can be family wherever they are.

It is valuable for Crete for Life and Play for Peace® to come together and be able to provide a more holistic healing to young people.

MIGRATIONS

ATHENS & SKARAMANGA HOT SPOT

The problem: Athens hosts the largest number of refugees and asylum seekers in Greece, mostly from Syria, Iraq and Afghanistan. Some are living in camps, like Skaramanga, just outside the city. Those who can, rent out apartments that are shared with other families, many live in squats and in abandoned public buildings, other still are homeless. Refugees and asylum seekers cannot work legally, and recession hit Greece has the highest unemployment rate of all EU states.

Objective: During 2017 Crete For Life main objective was that of distributing fresh and long life food, clothes, toiletries and medical aid, thanks to the support of the “Nando and Elsa Peretti Foundation”

What were the outputs?

We have cooperated with local charities and in particular with the Norwegian NGO “A Drop in the Ocean” and with the Greek charity “Pampiraiki”. During the year we have volunteered at Skaramangas Hot Spot, the largest refugees camp in Greece in order to understand first hand what were the real needs that were not met by other charities and institutions.

Throughout the year, Crete For Life volunteers visit Athens regularly and pay special attention to adapting their support to the fast changing needs of the people assisted.

We sourced and supplied new goods, and where possible we collected second-hand clothes and donated items. We focused on immediate urgent requests, such as diapers and infant milk, children shoes, underwear and pregnancy clothes.



Later in the year we connected with Pampiraiki who runs the Ellinikon Warehouse, the main central storage for donations and aid in Athens. They distribute fresh and dry foods and essential non-food items to more than 5000 people in camps, shelters, squats, day centres and private apartments. They also send much needed items to camps further outside Athens and to the warehouses on the Islands of Chios and Lesbos.

Crete is the leading region of Greece in greenhouse production of vegetables. We are able to source fresh vegetables not suitable for the general distribution because of size or irregular shapes, directly for the local farmers. Thus we have been supplying Pampiraiki, and participate in helping those most vulnerable.

MIGRATIONS

CRETE'S ECONOMIC MIGRANTS

What were the outcomes?

- Since January 2017, hundreds of children's shoes, clothes, dry food, children equipment and other goods have been delivered by Crete For Life volunteers
- Vegetables from Ierapetra are distributed in Athens among a minimum of 20 families each week.
- Over 20 young adults and children have been assisted with medical consultations and medicines, some with specialized care such as a customized wheelchair for a disabled young man.
- In Ierapetra an estimated 60 people from the Pakistani/Indian/Afghani communities are regularly helped with food and assistance from our food bank.
- Circa 80 people have been assisted occasionally with food, clothes and medical assistance.

For the 4th year, in Ierapetra, Crete, we have assisted with food distribution and medical support the local mainly Pakistani community. In Ierapetra, fresh and long life food, household goods and medical assistance have been shared among the many economic migrant.



It is estimated that up to 90% of Greece's agriculture wage labourers are economic migrants. Farm work is often the only option for them when they arrive in the country without accommodation, money or legal status. Exploitation and indignity of undocumented migrant labour is rife in Greece, many labourers are minors or very young adults, and most of them are not even receiving any of their low salaries (around € 20 per day) they are owed. They stay for lack of a better options, to help their families.

ASYLUM SEEKERS, REFUGEES & ECONOMIC MIGRANTS



Skaramanga, on the outskirts of Athens, is Greece's largest hotspot, a containers town hosting around 3400 people including 1700 children.



M.I. left Pakistan 7 years ago to find work to sustain his large family back home. His two children, aged 14 and 12, have recently run away from Pakistan to join him in Crete, travelling alone and separately, on foot for many months. They hoped to find work in Greece and help out their father. Last time these children saw their father they were respectively 7 and 5 years old. Way under European legal working age and not at school, the two brothers, and many others like them, bring to Europe their harsh living reality.



Thanks to the Nando and Elsa Peretti Foundation, through the program "Emergency relief and assistance to migrants and refugees in Crete, Greece" we can support refugees, asylum seekers and economic migrants, focusing particularly on children, unaccompanied minors and those most at risk. We provide practical help, food and medical aid and we want to be a reference point to those who have yet no voice in their new communities. Refugees and economic migrants might come from different realities but share the same impotence and uncertainty about their present and their future.

LOCAL COMMUNITY IERAPETRA



Objective: To provide support to local Greek families and individuals, who are most vulnerable because of the financial crisis.

What were the outputs?

We have been helping, by providing clothes, food and toiletries to families in need. Covering travel expenses to enable children to follow therapies in other parts of the country and we have also bought corrective glasses. We have distributed school kits and organized school tuition and sport support throughout the year.

In cooperation with the municipal social assistants, Crete For Life support in the local community extends to facilitating medical care for families, minors and those most vulnerable, we help those Greek families who are out of work and therefore have no access to the state's health system.

What were the outcomes?

A small number of children are regularly supported, and Crete For Life is in an open conversation with the local authorities and the Red Cross to help resolve needs that cannot be met through the official channels.

LOCAL COMMUNITY UNIVERSITY HOSPITAL, HERAKLION



Objective: Crete For Life supports the paediatric ward of Crete's University hospital, one of the top facilities in Greece serving thousands of patients every year.

What were the outcomes?

Thanks to a private donor, we were able to supply a few items requested by the nurses and the doctors, such as a new computer for the doctor's office and small chairs for the younger long term patients.

When Mary was on Crete everyone around her felt happy. A gentle, kind, fiercely intelligent woman, she understood human nature and all its limitations and she had a wonderful, contagious sense of humor. Thanks to Mary, Crete's University hospital now has many books, computers, chairs and much else, to make the doctors' work a little easier and the children's stay a happier one.

MEASURING OUR IMPACT

Key performance indicators

Through the year we monitor a number of Key Performance Indicators that help us towards achieving our strategic aims. Particular attention is given to

- the charity's expenditure
- the growth of private donations and foundations support
- crowd funding
- quality of the experience we offer at the annual summer camp
- feedback from the children and young people hosted in Crete
- number of families directly benefiting from the support programs

We are working to refine and sharpen the list of KPIs as part of our commitment to continuous learning and development.

Risk management

We have developed a risk management strategy which involves a regular review of key risks faced by the charity and the establishment of systems and procedures to address those potential risks and to minimise any impact on the charity if the risks materialise.

These are what we consider the main key risks facing the organisation

- Crete For Life is mostly reliant on foundations and therefore needs to take into account changing economic, policy and social conditions that may affect its individual supporters, corporate, major donors and trust funders.
- We put children safety above anything else. We recognise the importance of safeguarding children and young people in all areas of our work. The charity has a safeguarding policy which applies to all staff and volunteers who have regular contact with children and young people.
- We also include in our risk management policy solutions to any contrasts that might stem from cultural, ethnical, gender and religious differences between children, volunteers and anyone involved in Crete For Life.

THE CHILDREN AND YOUNG ADULTS WE HELP ARE:

FROM OUR VOLUNTEERS







Income & Outgoing in €




Running Costs 2016 = € 3482 = 11%


Running Costs 2017 = € 5170 = 8%





FUTURE CHALLENGES

Crete For Life has ambitious plans for the future. We are committed to helping as many young people around us as we can.

The impact of the Chernobyl catastrophe continue to be felt by the children of those directly affected by the catastrophe in 1986. At present, over one million children are still living in contaminated zones. Being able to escape a radioactive, highly toxic environment for just a few weeks extends each child's life by an estimated two years, and reduces their contamination levels by 30 to 50 percent. Just as important, these children return to their communities with the comforting knowledge that the outside world has not forgotten about them.

Our program of summer rest and recuperation, running since 2006, has proven through the years to have had a positive impact physically and mentally on the children hosted. Crete's dry, warm climate is ideal for many conditions these children suffer from, such as osteoporosis and chronic respiratory ailments. We hope to be able to continue to offer the possibility to many children to come and experience the beauty and healing properties of the Cretan sea with us.

Thousands of people fleeing from war and poverty are likely to remain in Greece, joined by the many more that continue to arrive by land and sea. Crete is seeing a first wave of resettlements, especially minors and vulnerable families, and it is likely that many more will follow. A constant flux of economic migrants, especially youngsters, continue to seek employment in the local agriculture economy, but Greece, that has been in a financial crisis for over 10 years, has the highest rate of unemployment in Europe, making life difficult for many Greeks and foreigners alike. In 2018 we would like to have the opportunity to support our local community at large, including new comers and in particular children, minors and those most at risk.

We are a very small charity run by a few, very committed volunteers. Our main challenges are those faced today by many charities who, like us, rely on private funding: that of insuring a constant influx of revenue to run our programs. We are extremely honoured and thankful for the trust foundations and donors have placed on us and our programs and we hope to continue consolidate our partnership with them.

OUR NEXT STEPS will be to increase our board's diversity to include new members and new outlooks, to enlarge the quality and quantity of the work we do. We are also working towards strategic partnerships to leverage expertise and seek both financial and non-financial resources. We are also planning to find resources to spend on a clear branding and a new website that will enhance our fundraising efforts. Increasing our use of technology and IT will also be used to monitoring and evaluation of our programs more effectively.


